CODE: MAN 104

PREREQUISITE: MAN 101, MAN 102 and MAN 103

CREDITS: 3 credits | 45 hours contact | 15 hours of laboratory | 1 term

DESCRIPTION

Students have acquired a good knowledge of the phonetics system, Chinese grammar, listening, speaking, reading and writing in MAN 101, MAN 102 and MAN 103.
