DESCRIPTION

This introductory course promotes theoretical reflection on art as an indispensable element for creation. It presents a historical tour of the main local and international artistic events, as well as the theories that have served to contextualize the social impact of artists and analyze and problematize artistic production. The intersections between art and the UN's Sustainable Development Goals are also explored.

JUSTIFICATION

This course puts students from the Bachelor of Arts in Visual Arts in contact with the most relevant theoretical and historical aspects of the field of Western art, from the fifteenth century to the present day. It provides a basis for the understanding of the relationship of art with the historical and cultural context to which it belongs and for the knowledge of the conceptual, philosophical, aesthetic, and ideological approaches related to the practice of art, which affect the history of art and the creative process. It also provides students with the tools to understand the factors that shape the art system, as well as the different styles and trends that have evolved over time.
