

SYLLABUS

TITLE: Basic Mandarin II

CODE: MAN 102

PREREQUISITE: MAN 101

CREDITS: 3 credits | 45 hours contact | 1 term | 15 hours of laboratory

DESCRIPTION

This course will offer the students the opportunity to develop a knowledge level of Chinese Mandarin. Cultivate the ability of cross-cultural communication, through the learning of Chinese structures, functions, and relevant cultural knowledge as well as the training in listening, speaking, reading and writing skills. We use the third edition of NPCR, mainly targeting students at overseas universities and Confucius Institutes. This course has a 1-hour weekly laboratory.

JUSTIFICATION

Language teaching is essential for a complete education. Studying other languages not only develops memory and stimulates creativity, but also allows direct contact with other nations and cultures. The history and functioning of foreign societies can be better understood and therefore better understood. The mastery of several languages would help university students obtain better jobs in fields such as: tourism, education, international trade, journalism and diplomacy. We seek to develop human beings free from prejudices, more open to human communication and international exchange.

- 1. Master elementary Chinese grammar knowledge.
- 2. Have the elementary ability of listening, speaking, reading and writing.
- 3. Ability to communicate in simple daily life in Chinese.
- 4. Good at typing Chinese characters on the computer.
- 5. Know more Chinese cultures.

- III. Elementary training for listening, speaking and writing
- IV. Elements of Chinese Holidays
- V. Elements of Chinese cultures

METHODOLOGY

- Teamwork
- Conferences illustrated by audiovisual and technological resources
