SYLLABUS

TITLE: Film and Literature

CODIFICATION: ESP 124

PREREQUISITE: ESP 106

CREDITS: 3 credits | 3 contact hours/week | 1 semester

DESCRIPTION

Study of literary texts that have been adapted to film. The transformation of the written image into visual images is examined. Emphasis is placed on the theoretical, technical, and thematic aspects of the genre. The course analyzes texts from Spain, Spanish America and the Caribbean.

JUSTIFICATION

Currently film as media occupies a place of great significance. Thus, the importance of studying the adaptation of literary texts. Students will benefit from the analysis of differences and similarities between these textual forms and their representation. The pairing of film and literature is also useful in the understanding of the relationship between art, human life, and society.

COMPETENCES

At the end of the course, the student will be able to:

1. Explain the transformation from the written word to visual images.
2. Work in groups to research literary and film genres.
3. Apply writing and research skills.
