TITLE: Body Expression I

CODE: TEA 250

PREREQUISITE: TEA 112

CREDITS: 3 credits | 45 contact hours | 1 term

DESCRIPTION

Introductory course to the art of mimicry and body expression, based on physical floor exercises, mimicry, gesture, gesticulation, and movements that develop the ability of human beings to communicate through their body, without the need for words.

JUSTIFICATION

Any actor or person interested in acting should know the possibilities of their body to make it expressive. Developing good physical flexibility and muscular coordination, based on exercises, allows the body to be transformed into another instrument of communication, especially to transmit feelings, something that every actor will work with in their future profession. This course provides the opportunity for the theatre student, to allow their body not to be an obstacle to their dramatic expression and thus to be able to interpret emotions with credibility.

1. Understand the importance of facial gestures, mimicry, and mannerisms for performance.

- 2. Understand the role body movement, rhythm, and wordless theatrical action play in acting and interpreting.

- 4. Walking at different dynamic rhythms.
- 5. Improvise, without words, situations involving different feelings and moods.
- 6. Move through scenes naturally and with more confidence.
